SENATE BILL NO. 753 (Substitute of Senate Bill No. 650 by Senator Cravins)

BY SENATOR CRAVINS

EMPLOYMENT. Authorizes the state attorney general or local district attorney to issue a cease and desist order after discovering an employer has hired undocumented aliens. (gov sig)

AN ACT

2	To amend and reenact R.S. 23:992 and to enact R.S. 23:996, relative to employment of
3	certain aliens; to prohibit the hiring of an alien who is not entitled to lawfully reside
4	or work in the United States; to require the filing of an affidavit with a licensing
5	agency; to provide with respect to an agency, department, board or commission of
6	state or a parish agency to notify the attorney general or local district attorney when
7	an employer who operates a business in the state knowingly employs an alien who
8	is not lawfully entitled to reside or work in the United States; to provide for the
9	attorney general or local district attorney to issue a cease and desist order; to provide
10	for penalties; and to provide for related matters.
11	Be it enacted by the Legislature of Louisiana:
12	Section 1. R.S. 23:992 is hereby amended and reenacted and R.S. 23:996 is hereby
13	enacted to read as follows:
14	§992. Employment of certain aliens; prohibition
15	<u>A.</u> * * *
16	B. Upon the employer's annual license renewal with their respective
17	boards or commissions, the employer must file an affidavit affirming that the

employer will have in its files an employment eligibility verification form required by the Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986 (8 U.S.C. 1324a) for each individual paid a salary or compensation for hours worked.

* * *

§996. Cease and desist order; injunctive relief

A. An agency, department, board or commission of the state or any political subdivision may notify the attorney general or the district attorney that the agency has determined, after an investigation initiated by the agency or by a private party's written complaint to the agency, that an employer who operates a Louisiana business or enterprise is knowingly employing an undocumented alien in violation of this Chapter.

B. The attorney general or district attorney in the parish in which the employer is domiciled or in the parish in which the violation occurred is empowered to issue an order to the employer engaged in the activity constituting the violation of the provision of this Chapter directing such employer to cease and desist from such activity and to discharge from employment, for cause, the undocumented workers. Such order shall be issued in the name of the state of Louisiana under the official seal of the attorney general or the official seal of district attorney and shall be served where the employer is domiciled in the state of Louisiana or the employer's registered agent in the state of Louisiana.

C. If the employer to whom the attorney general or district attorney directs a cease and desist order does not cease and desist the proscribed activity within ten days from service of such cease and desist order by certified mail, the attorney general or local district attorney may cause to issue a writ of injunction enjoining such employer from engaging in any activity proscribed by this Chapter. Such proceeding shall be brought in the district court having civil jurisdiction in any parish in which such employer has as its principal place of business or the parish where the violation has occurred. If the employer in

1	violation of this Chapter is a nonresident entity, such proceeding may be
2	brought in the Nineteenth Judicial District Court for the parish of East Baton
3	Rouge. All other provisions of law relative to injunctive relief apply.
4	Exhaustion of administrative remedies is not a prerequisite to judicial review.
5	D. Any employer who is found by the court to have violated a cease and
6	desist order of the attorney general or district attorney after it has become final
7	and while such order is in effect, shall forfeit and pay to the state of Louisiana
8	a sum of up to ten thousand dollars, unless the employer shows good cause to
9	the satisfaction of the issuer that the determination was issued in error.
10	E. Once an employer is found by the court to have violated a cease and
11	desist order of the attorney general or district attorney, the attorney general or
12	district attorney may file a complaint with the appropriate licensing board or
13	boards to have any employer's business license suspended or revoked.
14	* * *
15	Section 2. This Act shall become effective upon signature by the governor or, if not
16	signed by the governor, upon expiration of the time for bills to become law without signature
17	by the governor, as provided by Article III, Section 18 of the Constitution of Louisiana. If
18	vetoed by the governor and subsequently approved by the legislature, this Act shall become
19	effective on the day following such approval.

Cravins (SB 753)

Present law prohibits the employ, hire or recruitment for private or public employment, an alien who is not entitled to lawfully reside or work in the United States.

Proposed law retains present law and adds a requirement for the employer to file an affidavit with their respective annual license renewal agency that the employer has in its files a federal employment eligibility verification form for each employee.

Proposed law permits an agency, department, board or commission of the state or any political subdivision to notify the attorney general or district attorney when an employer who operates a La. business knowingly employs an undocumented alien.

<u>Proposed law</u> empowers the attorney general or district attorney to file a cease and desist order to the employer who is in violation of the prohibition against hiring undocumented

aliens.

<u>Proposed law</u> gives the employer against whom a cease and desist order has been issued, 10 days to comply with such order. After 10 days, the attorney general or district attorney may seek an injunction enjoining such employer from engaging in the employment of undocumented aliens.

<u>Proposed law</u> provides a penalty of up to \$10,000 on the employer in violation of a cease and desist order.

<u>Proposed law</u> permits the attorney general or district attorney to file a complaint with the appropriate licensing board of the employer in violation of a cease and desist order to have the employer's business license suspended or revoked.

Effective upon signature of the governor or lapse of time for gubernatorial action.
