

AN ACT

relating to the operation and administration of and practices and procedures related to proceedings in the judicial branch of state government, including court security, court documents and arrest warrants, document delivery, juvenile boards, constitutional amendment election challenges, mandatory expunction for certain persons, record retention, and youth diversion; increasing a criminal penalty; authorizing fees.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

ARTICLE 1. DISTRICT COURTS, DISTRICT CLERKS, AND DISTRICT ATTORNEYS

18 SECTION 2.01. Sections 22.004(b) and (h-1), Government
19 Code, are amended to read as follows:

20 (b) The supreme court from time to time may promulgate a
21 specific rule or rules of civil procedure, or an amendment or
22 amendments to a specific rule or rules, to be effective at the time
23 the supreme court deems expedient in the interest of a proper
24 administration of justice. The rules and amendments to rules
25 remain in effect unless and until disapproved by the
26 legislature. The clerk of the supreme court shall file with the
27 secretary of state the rules or amendments to rules promulgated by

1 the supreme court under this subsection and shall provide [~~mail~~] a
2 copy of those rules or amendments to rules to each registered member
3 of the State Bar of Texas not later than the 60th day before the date
4 on which they become effective. On receiving a written request
5 from a member of the legislature, the secretary of state shall
6 provide the member with electronic notifications when the supreme
7 court has promulgated rules or amendments to rules under this
8 section.

9 (h-1) In addition to the rules adopted under Subsection (h),
10 the supreme court shall adopt rules to promote the prompt,
11 efficient, and cost-effective resolution of civil actions filed in
12 county courts at law in which the amount in controversy does not
13 exceed \$325,000 [~~\$250,000~~]. The rules shall balance the need for
14 lowering discovery costs in these actions against the complexity of
15 and discovery needs in these actions. The supreme court may not
16 adopt rules under this subsection that conflict with other
17 statutory law.

24 (6) "Parent" has the meaning assigned by Article
25 45A.457(a).

26 (7) "Service provider" means a governmental agency,
27 political subdivision, open-enrollment charter school, nonprofit

1 organization, or other entity that provides services to children or
2 families.

3 (8) "Traffic offense" has the meaning assigned by
4 Section 51.02, Family Code.

5 (9) "Youth diversion plan" means a plan adopted under
6 Article 45A.506.

7 Art. 45A.502. APPLICABILITY. This subchapter applies only
8 to a child who is alleged to have engaged in conduct that
9 constitutes a misdemeanor punishable by fine only, other than a
10 traffic offense.

11 Art. 45A.503. TRANSFER TO JUVENILE COURT NOT AFFECTED.
12 Nothing in this subchapter precludes:

17 (C) substantially comply with a course of
18 treatment prescribed by a physician or other licensed medical or
19 mental health professional; and
20 (4) requiring a child, by court order, to:

18 measurable, realistic, and reasonable and consider the

18 the charge being diverted, or the diversion strategy used.

9 county clerk, district clerk, or county and district clerk, or as a
10 federal bankruptcy judge, a marshal of the United States Marshals
11 Service, ~~or~~ a United States attorney, or for a license holder
12 whose duties relate to court administration, including a court
13 clerk, court coordinator, court administrator, juvenile case
14 manager, law clerk, or staff attorney, or as an employee of the
15 office of a county clerk, district clerk, or county and district
16 clerk, or of the Office of Court Administration of the Texas
17 Judicial System and entities administratively attached to the
18 office, or as an employee or commissioner of the State Commission on

26 (c-1) The residence address of a license holder whose
27 residence address is omitted using the procedure under Subsection

1 (c) is confidential and is available only for the official use of
2 the department or a law enforcement agency.

3 SECTION 13.19. Section 521.243(a), Transportation Code, is
4 amended to read as follows:

5 (a) Unless the petition is dismissed under Section
6 521.2421(f), the clerk of the court shall send electronically or by
7 a delivery method described by Rule 21a, Texas Rules of Civil
8 Procedure, [~~by certified mail~~] to the attorney representing the
9 state a copy of the petition and notice of the hearing if the
10 petitioner's license was suspended, revoked, or canceled following
11 a conviction for:

12 (1) an offense under Section 19.05 or Sections
13 49.04-49.08, Penal Code; or

14 (2) an offense to which Section 521.342 applies.

15 SECTION 13.20. Article 43.09(a), Code of Criminal
16 Procedure, as amended by this article, applies to a defendant who is
17 confined or performs labor to discharge fines or costs on or after
18 September 1, 2025, regardless of whether the offense for which the
19 fines or costs were imposed occurred before, on, or after September
20 1, 2025.

21 SECTION 13.21. The changes in law made by this article to
22 Articles 43.09(k), 45A.254(e), 45A.459(i), and 45A.460(i), Code of
23 Criminal Procedure, apply to a defendant who performs community
24 service to discharge fines or costs on or after September 1, 2025,
25 regardless of whether the offense for which the fines or costs were
26 imposed occurred before, on, or after September 1, 2025.

27 SECTION 13.22. Article 45A.251(e), Code of Criminal

1 Procedure, as amended by this article, applies to a defendant who is
2 sentenced for an offense on or after September 1, 2025, regardless
3 of whether the offense was committed before, on, or after that date.

4 SECTION 13.23. Section 301.052(a), Family Code, as amended
5 by this article, applies to an action that is pending in a trial
6 court on September 1, 2025, or that is filed on or after that date.

7 SECTION 13.24. Section 42.07, Penal Code, as amended by
8 this article, applies only to an offense committed on or after
9 September 1, 2025. An offense committed before that date is
10 governed by the law in effect on the date the offense was committed,
11 and the former law is continued in effect for that purpose. For
12 purposes of this section, an offense was committed before September
13 1, 2025, if any element of the offense occurred before that date.

10 successful completion of a veterans treatment court program created
11 under Chapter 124, Government Code, or former law; or

12 (2) receives the information regarding the dismissal.

13 (b) A trial court that is a district court or a district
14 court in the county in which the trial court is located shall [~~may,~~
15 ~~with the consent of the attorney representing the state,~~] enter an
16 expunction order for a person entitled to expunction under Article
17 55A.053(a)(2)(B) not later than the 30th day after the date the
18 court, as applicable:

19 (1) dismisses the case following the person's
20 successful completion of a mental health court program created
21 under Chapter 125, Government Code, or former law; or

22 (2) receives the information regarding the dismissal.

23 (b-1) A trial court that is a district court or a district
24 court in the county in which the trial court is located shall enter
25 an expunction order for a person entitled to expunction under
26 Article 55A.053(a)(2)(C) not later than the 30th day after the date
27 the court, as applicable:

1 (1) dismisses the case following the person's
2 successful completion of a pretrial intervention program
3 authorized under Section 76.011, Government Code, other than a
4 program described by Subsection (a)(1) or (b)(1) of this section;
5 or

6 (2) receives the information regarding the dismissal.

7 (d) The person for whom a court is required to enter an
8 expunction order under Subsection (a), (b), or (b-1), as
9 applicable, shall provide to the attorney representing the state
10 all of the information required in a petition for expunction under
11 Article 55A.253 and any affidavit required under Article 55A.053(b)
12 or (c). The attorney representing the state shall prepare an
13 expunction order under this article for the court's signature.

14 SECTION 14.02. Subchapter E, Chapter 55A, Code of Criminal
15 Procedure, is amended by adding Article 55A.2035 to read as
16 follows:

17 Art. 55A.2035. ATTORNEY REPRESENTING STATE CERTIFIES
18 RECORDS AND FILES NOT NEEDED. (a) A trial court that is a district
19 court or a district court in the county in which the trial court is
20 located shall enter an expunction order for a person entitled to
21 expunction under Article 55A.052(a)(4) not later than the 30th day
22 after the date the court receives the certification described by
23 that subdivision.

24 (b) The attorney representing the state who certified under
25 Article 55A.052(a)(4) that the applicable arrest records and files
26 are not needed for use in any criminal investigation or prosecution
27 shall prepare an expunction order under this article for the

1 court's signature. The person for whom a court is required to enter
2 an expunction order under Subsection (a) shall provide to the
3 attorney representing the state all of the information required in
4 a petition for expunction under Article 55A.253.

5 (c) Notwithstanding any other law, a court that enters an
6 expunction order under this article may not charge any fee or assess
7 any cost for the expunction.

8 SECTION 14.03. Subchapter H, Chapter 55A, Code of Criminal
9 Procedure, is amended by adding Article 55A.358 to read as follows:

10 Art. 55A.358. RETENTION OF RECORDS FOR DEVELOPMENT AND
11 OPERATION OF PRETRIAL INTERVENTION PROGRAMS. Notwithstanding
12 Articles 55A.353, 55A.354, 55A.355, and 55A.356, a community
13 supervision and corrections department established under Chapter
14 76, Government Code, or an office of an attorney representing the
15 state, in possession of records and files subject to an expunction
16 order based on an entitlement under Article 55A.053(a)(2)(A), (B),
17 or (C) may retain and use those records and files only for the
18 purpose of developing and operating pretrial intervention programs
19 in a judicial district served by the department or office.

20 ARTICLE 15. CONFLICT; EFFECTIVE DATE

21 SECTION 15.01. To the extent of any conflict, this Act
22 prevails over another Act of the 89th Legislature, Regular Session,
23 2025, relating to nonsubstantive additions to and corrections in
24 enacted codes.

25 SECTION 15.02. Except as otherwise provided by a provision
26 of this Act, this Act takes effect September 1, 2025.
