

1 AN ACT concerning State government.

2 **Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois,**  
3 **represented in the General Assembly:**

4 Section 1. Short title. This Act may be cited as the  
5 Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum Act.

6 Section 5. Definitions. For the purposes of this Act:

7 "Agency" means the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library  
8 and Museum.

9 "Board" means the Board of the Abraham Lincoln Presidential  
10 Library and Museum.

11 "Executive Director" means the Executive Director of the  
12 Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum.

13 "Library" means the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library.

14 "Museum" means the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Museum.

15 Section 10. Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and  
16 Museum; establishment; Foundation.

17 (a) The Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum,  
18 formerly a constituent unit of the Illinois Historic  
19 Preservation Agency, is created as an independent State agency.

20 (b) The Agency shall be under the supervision and direction  
21 of the Executive Director of the Abraham Lincoln Presidential  
22 Library and Museum.

1           (c) There shall be a Board of the Abraham Lincoln  
2 Presidential Library and Museum to advise the Abraham Lincoln  
3 Presidential Library and Museum and the Executive Director on  
4 programs related to the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library  
5 and Museum. The Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum  
6 and the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library Foundation shall  
7 mutually co-operate to maximize resources available to the  
8 Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum and to support,  
9 sustain, and provide educational programs and collections at  
10 the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum.

11           Section 15. Board; initial members.

12           (a) The Board of the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library  
13 and Museum shall consist of 11 members to be appointed by the  
14 Governor, with the advice and consent of the Senate. Each of  
15 these members shall have recognized knowledge and ability in  
16 matters relating to history, research, cultural institutions,  
17 archives, libraries, business, or education. The terms of  
18 office of these members shall be 6 years, except that the terms  
19 of office of the initial members shall commence from the  
20 effective date of this Act and run as provided under subsection  
21 (b) of this Section.

22           (b) The appointees that currently serve, as of the  
23 effective date of this Act, on the Advisory Board of the  
24 Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum previously created  
25 under Section 30 of the Historic Preservation Agency Act (now

1 repealed) shall serve as the initial members of the Board  
2 created under Section 10 of this Act until they complete the  
3 unexpired portions of the terms to which they were appointed  
4 under Section 31 of the Historic Preservation Agency Act (now  
5 repealed) or until the Governor appoints a successor to replace  
6 the initial member. Successors, including a new Chairperson,  
7 shall be appointed by the Governor in accordance with  
8 subsection (a) of this Section.

9 Section 20. Powers and duties of the Board. The Board shall  
10 have the following powers and duties:

11 (a) Establish programs for implementation in support of the  
12 mission and goals of the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library  
13 and Museum.

14 (b) Create and execute such seminars, symposia, or other  
15 conferences as may be necessary or advisable to the Abraham  
16 Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum.

17 (c) Report annually to the Governor and the General  
18 Assembly on the status of the Abraham Lincoln Presidential  
19 Library and Museum and its programs.

20 (d) Hire agents and employees necessary to carry out the  
21 duties and purposes of the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library  
22 and Museum.

23 (e) Accept, hold, maintain, and administer, as trustee,  
24 property given in trust for educational or historic purposes  
25 for the benefit of the people of the State of Illinois and to

1 dispose of any property under the terms of the instrument  
2 creating the trust.

3 (f) Accept, hold, maintain, and administer donated  
4 property of historical significance such as books, papers,  
5 records, and personal property of any kind, including  
6 electronic and digital property, pursuant to gifting  
7 instruments, agreements, or deeds of gift and to enter into  
8 such agreements as may be necessary to carry out the Board's  
9 duties and responsibilities under this Section.

10 (g) Lease concessions at the Library and Museum. All  
11 leases, for whatever period, shall be made subject to the  
12 written approval of the Governor. All concession leases  
13 extending for a period in excess of 10 years shall contain  
14 provisions for the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and  
15 Museum to participate, on a percentage basis, in the revenues  
16 generated by any concession operation.

17 (h) Enforce the laws of the State and the rules of the  
18 Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum at the Library  
19 and Museum.

20 (i) Cooperate with private organizations and agencies of  
21 the State of Illinois by providing areas and the use of staff  
22 personnel where feasible for the sale of publications on the  
23 historic and cultural heritage of the State and craft items  
24 made by Illinois craftsmen. These sales shall not conflict with  
25 existing concession agreements. The Board is authorized to  
26 negotiate and approve agreements with the organizations and

1 agencies for a portion of the monies received from sales to be  
2 returned to the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum  
3 for the furtherance of interpretive and restoration programs.

4 (j) Establish local bank or savings and loan association  
5 accounts, upon the written authorization of the Executive  
6 Director, to temporarily hold income received at any of its  
7 properties. The local accounts established under this  
8 subsection shall be in the name of the Abraham Lincoln  
9 Presidential Library and Museum and shall be subject to regular  
10 audits. The balance in a local bank or savings and loan  
11 association account shall be forwarded to the Abraham Lincoln  
12 Presidential Library and Museum for deposit with the State  
13 Treasurer on Monday of each week if the amount to be deposited  
14 in a fund exceeds \$500.

15 No bank or savings and loan association shall receive  
16 public funds as permitted by this Section, unless it has  
17 complied with the requirements established under Section 6 of  
18 the Public Funds Investment Act.

19 (k) Accept offers of gifts, gratuities, or grants from the  
20 federal government, its agencies, or offices, or from any  
21 person, firm, or corporation.

22 (l) Subject to the provisions of the Illinois  
23 Administrative Procedure Act, make reasonable rules as may be  
24 necessary to discharge the duties of the Abraham Lincoln  
25 Presidential Library and Museum.

26 (m) Charge and collect admission fees and rental for access

1 to and use of the facilities of the Library and Museum.

2 (n) Operate a restaurant, café, or other food serving  
3 facility at the Museum or to lease the operation of such a  
4 facility under reasonable terms and conditions; to provide  
5 vending services for food, beverages, or other products deemed  
6 necessary and proper, consistent with the mission and purposes  
7 of the Library and Museum.

8 (o) To engage in marketing activities designed to promote  
9 the Library and Museum. In undertaking these activities, the  
10 Board may take all necessary steps with respect to products and  
11 services, including, but not limited to, retail sales,  
12 wholesale sales, direct marketing, mail order sales, telephone  
13 sales, advertising and promotion, purchase of product and  
14 materials inventory, design, printing and manufacturing of new  
15 products, reproductions, and adaptations, copyright and  
16 trademark licensing and royalty agreements, and payment of  
17 applicable taxes. In addition, the Board shall have the  
18 authority to sell advertising in its publications and printed  
19 materials.

20 Section 25. Administration of the Abraham Lincoln  
21 Presidential Library and Museum. The Board shall appoint an  
22 Executive Director of the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library  
23 and Museum. The Executive Director shall serve at the pleasure  
24 of the Board. The Executive Director shall, subject to  
25 applicable provisions of law, execute and discharge the powers

1 and duties of the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and  
2 Museum. The Executive Director shall appoint: (a) a Library  
3 Facilities Operations Director; and (b) a Director of the  
4 Library. The Executive Director shall appoint those other  
5 employees of the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and  
6 Museum and the Illinois State Historical Library as he or she  
7 deems appropriate and shall fix the compensation of the Library  
8 Facilities Operations Director, the Director of the Library,  
9 and other employees. The Executive Director may establish and  
10 collect admission and registration fees, may operate a gift  
11 shop, and may publish and sell educational and informational  
12 materials.

13 Section 30. Gifts to the Illinois State Historical Library.  
14 Those programs, collections, and functions heretofore  
15 administered by the Illinois State Historical Library or the  
16 Historical Preservation Agency's Historical Library Division  
17 shall be administered by the Abraham Lincoln Presidential  
18 Library and Museum. All gifts made specifically to the Illinois  
19 State Historical Library or the Historical Preservation  
20 Agency's Historical Library Division shall remain at all times  
21 within the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum.

22 Section 35. Director of the Abraham Lincoln Presidential  
23 Library; historical collections. The Director of the Library  
24 may and is hereby required to make all necessary rules,

1 regulations, and bylaws not inconsistent with law to carry into  
2 effect the purposes of this Section in accordance with the  
3 State Historical Library Act and to procure from time to time  
4 as may be possible and practicable, at reasonable cost, all  
5 books, pamphlets, manuscripts, monographs, writings, and other  
6 material of historical interest and useful to the historian  
7 bearing upon the political, physical, religious, or social  
8 history of the State of Illinois from the earliest known period  
9 of time. The Director of the Library may exchange any books,  
10 pamphlets, manuscripts, records, or other material which such  
11 library may acquire that are of no historical interest or for  
12 any reason are of no value to it, with any other library,  
13 school, or historical society. The Director of the Library  
14 shall distribute volumes of the series known as the Illinois  
15 Historical Collections now in print, and to be printed, to all  
16 who may apply for same and who pay to the Library for such  
17 volumes an amount fixed by the Director sufficient to cover the  
18 expenses of printing and distribution of each volume received  
19 by such applicants. However, the Director of the Library shall  
20 have authority to furnish not to exceed 25 of each of the  
21 volumes of the Illinois Historical Collections, free of charge  
22 to each of the authors and editors of the collections or parts  
23 thereof; to furnish, as in his or her discretion he or she  
24 deems necessary or desirable, a reasonable number of each of  
25 the volumes of the Collections without charge to archives,  
26 libraries, and similar institutions from which material has



1 been drawn or assistance has been given in the preparation of  
2 such Collections, and to the officials thereof; to furnish, as  
3 in his or her discretion he or she deems necessary or  
4 desirable, a reasonable number of each of the volumes of the  
5 Collections without charge to the University of Illinois  
6 Library and to instructors and officials of that University,  
7 and to public libraries in the State of Illinois. The Director  
8 of the Library may also make exchanges of Historical  
9 Collections with any other library, school, or historical  
10 society, and to distribute volumes of collections for review  
11 purposes.

12 Section 40. Separation from Historic Preservation Agency.  
13 On the effective date of this Act, all of the powers, duties,  
14 assets, liabilities, employees, contracts, property, including  
15 any items formerly contained in the Illinois State Historical  
16 Library now presently held in the Abraham Lincoln Presidential  
17 Library and Museum, records, pending business, and unexpended  
18 appropriations of the Historic Preservation Agency related to  
19 the administration and enforcement of Sections 17, 30, 31, 32,  
20 and 33 of the Historic Preservation Agency Act (now repealed)  
21 are transferred to the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and  
22 Museum created under this Act.

23 The status and rights of the transferred employees, and the  
24 rights of the State of Illinois and its agencies, under the  
25 Personnel Code and applicable collective bargaining agreements

1 or under any pension, retirement, or annuity plan are not  
2 affected (except as provided in Sections 14-110 and 18-127 of  
3 the Illinois Pension Code) by that transfer or by any other  
4 provision of this Act.

5 Section 45. The Executive Reorganization Implementation  
6 Act is amended by changing Section 3.1 as follows:

7 (15 ILCS 15/3.1) (from Ch. 127, par. 1803.1)

8 Sec. 3.1. "Agency directly responsible to the Governor" or  
9 "agency" means any office, officer, division, or part thereof,  
10 and any other office, nonelective officer, department,  
11 division, bureau, board, or commission in the executive branch  
12 of State government, except that it does not apply to any  
13 agency whose primary function is service to the General  
14 Assembly or the Judicial Branch of State government, or to any  
15 agency administered by the Attorney General, Secretary of  
16 State, State Comptroller or State Treasurer. In addition the  
17 term does not apply to the following agencies created by law  
18 with the primary responsibility of exercising regulatory or  
19 adjudicatory functions independently of the Governor:

- 20 (1) the State Board of Elections;
- 21 (2) the State Board of Education;
- 22 (3) the Illinois Commerce Commission;
- 23 (4) the Illinois Workers' Compensation Commission;
- 24 (5) the Civil Service Commission;

3 (8) the Department of State Police Merit Board;  
4 (9) the Illinois Racing Board;

8 Section 50. The Historic Preservation Agency Act is amended  
9 by changing Sections 2, 4, 5, 5.1, 6, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16,  
10 22, and 34 as follows:

5 Sec. 4. The Board shall be responsible for setting and  
6 determining policy for the Agency. ~~The Agency shall consist of:~~  
7 ~~(1) an Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum and (2)~~  
8 ~~a Historic Sites and Preservation Division. Except as otherwise~~  
9 ~~provided in this Act, any reference in any other Act to the~~  
10 ~~Historic Preservation Agency shall be deemed to be a reference~~  
11 ~~to the Historic Sites and Preservation Division and any~~  
12 ~~reference to the Director of Historic Preservation shall be~~

15 The Board shall appoint a chief executive officer of the  
16 Agency who shall be known as the Director of the Historic Sites  
17 ~~and~~ Preservation Agency. The Director shall serve at the  
18 pleasure of the Board. The Director shall, subject to  
19 applicable provisions of law, execute the powers and discharge  
20 the duties vested in the ~~Historic Sites and Preservation~~  
21 ~~Division of the~~ Agency by law and implement the policies set by  
22 the Board. The Director shall manage the ~~Historic Sites and~~  
23 ~~Preservation Division of the~~ Agency. The Director, with the  
24 concurrence of the Board, shall appoint Division Chiefs, if  
25 needed, and the Deputy Director of the ~~Historic Sites and~~

1 Preservation ~~Division of the~~ Agency. Subject to concurrence by  
2 the Board, the Director shall appoint such other employees of  
3 ~~the Historic Sites and Preservation Division of~~ the Agency as  
4 he or she deems appropriate and shall fix the compensation of  
5 such Division Chiefs, if any, the Deputy Director, and other  
6 employees. The Board shall appoint the Illinois State  
7 Historian, who shall provide historical expertise, support,  
8 and service to ~~all divisions of~~ the Historic Preservation  
9 Agency and to all divisions of the Agency, if any. The State  
10 Historian is the State's authority on Abraham Lincoln and the  
11 history of Illinois.

9 power, with the consent of the Board, to enter into contracts,  
10 acquire and dispose of real and personal property, and enter  
11 into leases of real and personal property. The Agency has the  
12 power to acquire, for purposes authorized by law, any real  
13 property in fee simple subject to a life estate in the seller  
14 in not more than 3 acres of the real property acquired, subject  
15 to the restrictions that the life estate shall be used for  
16 residential purposes only and that it shall be  
17 non-transferable.

18 (c) To provide recreational facilities including camp  
19 sites, lodges and cabins, trails, picnic areas and related  
20 recreational facilities at all sites under the jurisdiction of  
21 the Agency.

22 (d) To lay out, construct and maintain all needful roads,  
23 parking areas, paths or trails, bridges, camp or lodge sites,  
24 picnic areas, lodges and cabins, and any other structures and  
25 improvements necessary and appropriate in any State historic  
26 site or easement thereto; and to provide water supplies, heat

1 and light, and sanitary facilities for the public and living  
2 quarters for the custodians and keepers of State historic  
3 sites.

4 (e) To grant licenses and rights-of-way within the areas  
5 controlled by the ~~Historic Sites and Preservation Division of~~  
6 ~~the~~ Agency for the construction, operation and maintenance  
7 upon, under or across the property, of facilities for water,  
8 sewage, telephone, telegraph, electric, gas, or other public  
9 service, subject to the terms and conditions as may be  
10 determined by the Agency.

11 (f) To authorize the officers, employees and agents of the  
12 ~~Historic Sites and Preservation Division of the~~ Agency, for the  
13 purposes of investigation and to exercise the rights, powers,  
14 and duties vested and that may be vested in it, to enter and  
15 cross all lands and waters in this State, doing no damage to  
16 private property.

17 (g) To transfer jurisdiction of or exchange any realty  
18 under the control of the ~~Historic Sites and Preservation~~  
19 ~~Division of the~~ Agency to any other Department of the State  
20 Government, or to any agency of the Federal Government, or to  
21 acquire or accept Federal lands, when any transfer, exchange,  
22 acquisition or acceptance is advantageous to the State and is  
23 approved in writing by the Governor.

24 (h) To erect, supervise, and maintain all public monuments  
25 and memorials erected by the State, except when the supervision  
26 and maintenance of public monuments and memorials is otherwise

1 provided by law.

2 (i) To accept, hold, maintain, and administer, as trustee,  
3 property given in trust for educational or historic purposes  
4 for the benefit of the People of the State of Illinois and to  
5 dispose, with the consent of the Board, of any property under  
6 the terms of the instrument creating the trust.

7 (j) To lease concessions on any property under the  
8 jurisdiction of the Agency for a period not exceeding 25 years  
9 and to lease a concession complex at Lincoln's New Salem State  
10 Historic Site for which a cash incentive has been authorized  
11 under Section 5.1 of the Historic Preservation Agency Act for a  
12 period not to exceed 40 years. All leases, for whatever period,  
13 shall be made subject to the written approval of the Governor.  
14 All concession leases extending for a period in excess of 10  
15 years, will contain provisions for the Agency to participate,  
16 on a percentage basis, in the revenues generated by any  
17 concession operation.

18 The Agency is authorized to allow for provisions for a  
19 reserve account and a leasehold account within Agency  
20 concession lease agreements for the purpose of setting aside  
21 revenues for the maintenance, rehabilitation, repair,  
22 improvement, and replacement of the concession facility,  
23 structure, and equipment of the Agency that are part of the  
24 leased premises.

25 The lessee shall be required to pay into the reserve  
26 account a percentage of gross receipts, as set forth in the

1 lease, to be set aside and expended in a manner acceptable to  
2 the Agency by the concession lessee for the purpose of ensuring  
3 that an appropriate amount of the lessee's moneys are provided  
4 by the lessee to satisfy the lessee's incurred responsibilities  
5 for the operation of the concession facility under the terms  
6 and conditions of the concession lease.

7 The lessee account shall allow for the amortization of  
8 certain authorized expenses that are incurred by the concession  
9 lessee but that are not an obligation of the lessee under the  
10 terms and conditions of the lease agreement. The Agency may  
11 allow a reduction of up to 50% of the monthly rent due for the  
12 purpose of enabling the recoument of the lessee's authorized  
13 expenditures during the term of the lease.

14 (k) To sell surplus agricultural products grown on land  
15 owned by or under the jurisdiction of the ~~Historic Sites and~~  
16 ~~Preservation Division of the~~ Agency, when the products cannot  
17 be used by the Agency.

18 (l) To enforce the laws of the State and the rules and  
19 regulations of the Agency in or on any lands owned, leased, or  
20 managed by the ~~Historic Sites and Preservation Division of the~~  
21 Agency.

22 (m) To cooperate with private organizations and agencies of  
23 the State of Illinois by providing areas and the use of staff  
24 personnel where feasible for the sale of publications on the  
25 historic and cultural heritage of the State and craft items  
26 made by Illinois craftsmen. These sales shall not conflict with

1 existing concession agreements. The ~~Historic Sites and~~  
2 ~~Preservation Division of the~~ Agency is authorized to negotiate  
3 with the organizations and agencies for a portion of the monies  
4 received from sales to be returned to the ~~Historic Sites and~~  
5 ~~Preservation Division of the~~ Agency's Historic Sites Fund for  
6 the furtherance of interpretive and restoration programs.

7 (n) To establish local bank or savings and loan association  
8 accounts, upon the written authorization of the Director, to  
9 temporarily hold income received at any of its properties. The  
10 local accounts established under this Section shall be in the  
11 name of the Historic Preservation Agency and shall be subject  
12 to regular audits. The balance in a local bank or savings and  
13 loan association account shall be forwarded to the Agency for  
14 deposit with the State Treasurer on Monday of each week if the  
15 amount to be deposited in a fund exceeds \$500.

16 No bank or savings and loan association shall receive  
17 public funds as permitted by this Section, unless it has  
18 complied with the requirements established under Section 6 of  
19 the Public Funds Investment Act.

20 (o) To accept, with the consent of the Board, offers of  
21 gifts, gratuities, or grants from the federal government, its  
22 agencies, or offices, or from any person, firm, or corporation.

23 (p) To make reasonable rules and regulations as may be  
24 necessary to discharge the duties of the Agency.

25 (q) With appropriate cultural organizations, to further  
26 and advance the goals of the Agency.

1 (r) To make grants for the purposes of planning, survey,  
2 rehabilitation, restoration, reconstruction, landscaping, and  
3 acquisition of Illinois properties (i) designated individually  
4 in the National Register of Historic Places, (ii) designated as  
5 a landmark under a county or municipal landmark ordinance, or  
6 (iii) located within a National Register of Historic Places  
7 historic district or a locally designated historic district  
8 when the Director determines that the property is of historic  
9 significance whenever an appropriation is made therefor by the  
10 General Assembly or whenever gifts or grants are received for  
11 that purpose and to promulgate regulations as may be necessary  
12 or desirable to carry out the purposes of the grants.

13 Grantees may, as prescribed by rule, be required to provide  
14 matching funds for each grant. Grants made under this  
15 subsection shall be known as Illinois Heritage Grants.

16 Every owner of a historic property, or the owner's agent,  
17 is eligible to apply for a grant under this subsection.

18 (s) To establish and implement a pilot program for charging  
19 admission to State historic sites. Fees may be charged for  
20 special events, admissions, and parking or any combination;  
21 fees may be charged at all sites or selected sites. All fees  
22 shall be deposited into the Illinois Historic Sites Fund. The  
23 ~~Historic Sites and Preservation Division of the~~ Agency shall  
24 have the discretion to set and adjust reasonable fees at the  
25 various sites, taking into consideration various factors  
26 including but not limited to: cost of services furnished to



1 each visitor, impact of fees on attendance and tourism and the  
2 costs expended collecting the fees. The Agency shall keep  
3 careful records of the income and expenses resulting from the  
4 imposition of fees, shall keep records as to the attendance at  
5 each historic site, and shall report to the Governor and

7 The report shall include information on costs, expenses,  
8 attendance, comments by visitors, and any other information the  
9 Agency may believe pertinent, including:

10 (1) Recommendations as to whether fees should be  
11 continued at each State historic site.

12 (2) How the fees should be structured and imposed.

13 (3) Estimates of revenues and expenses associated with  
14 each site.

15 (t) To provide for overnight tent and trailer campsites and  
16 to provide suitable housing facilities for student and juvenile  
17 overnight camping groups. ~~The Historic Sites and Preservation~~  
18 ~~Division of the~~ Agency shall charge rates similar to those  
19 charged by the Department of Conservation for the same or  
20 similar facilities and services.

21 (u) To engage in marketing activities designed to promote  
22 the sites and programs administered by the Agency. In  
23 undertaking these activities, the Agency may take all necessary  
24 steps with respect to products and services, including but not  
25 limited to retail sales, wholesale sales, direct marketing,  
26 mail order sales, telephone sales, advertising and promotion,

1 purchase of product and materials inventory, design, printing  
2 and manufacturing of new products, reproductions, and  
3 adaptations, copyright and trademark licensing and royalty  
4 agreements, and payment of applicable taxes. In addition, the  
5 Agency shall have the authority to sell advertising in its  
6 publications and printed materials. All income from marketing  
7 activities shall be deposited into the Illinois Historic Sites  
8 Fund.

11 Sec. 22. Amistad Commission.

12 (a) Purpose. The General Assembly finds and declares that  
13 all people should know of and remember the human carnage and  
14 dehumanizing atrocities committed during the period of the  
15 African slave trade and slavery in America and of the vestiges  
16 of slavery in this country; and it is in fact vital to educate  
17 our citizens on these events, the legacy of slavery, the sad  
18 history of racism in this country, and the principles of human  
19 rights and dignity in a civilized society.

20 It is the policy of the State of Illinois that the history  
21 of the African slave trade, slavery in America, the depth of  
22 their impact in our society, and the triumphs of  
23 African-Americans and their significant contributions to the  
24 development of this country is the proper concern of all  
25 people, particularly students enrolled in the schools of the

1 State of Illinois.

2 It is therefore desirable to create a Commission that, as  
3 an organized body and on a continuous basis, will survey,  
4 design, encourage, and promote the implementation of education  
5 and awareness programs in Illinois that are concerned with the  
6 African slave trade, slavery in America, the vestiges of  
7 slavery in this country, and the contributions of  
8 African-Americans in building our country; to develop  
9 workshops, institutes, seminars, and other teacher training  
10 activities designed to educate teachers on this subject matter;  
11 and that will be responsible for the coordination of events on  
12 a regular basis, throughout the State, that provide appropriate  
13 memorialization of the events concerning the enslavement of  
14 Africans and their descendants in America and their struggle  
15 for freedom, liberty, and equality.

16 (b) Amistad Commission. The Amistad Commission is created  
17 within the Agency. The Commission is named to honor the group  
18 of enslaved Africans transported in 1839 on a vessel named the  
19 Amistad who overthrew their captors and created an  
20 international incident that was eventually argued before the  
21 Supreme Court and that shed a growing light on the evils of the  
22 slave trade and galvanized a growing abolitionist movement  
23 towards demanding the end of slavery in the United States.

24 (c) Membership. The Commission shall consist of 15 members,  
25 including 3 ex officio members: the State Superintendent of  
26 Education or his or her designee, the Director of Commerce and

1 Economic Opportunity or his or her designee, and the Director  
2 of the Historic ~~Sites and~~ Preservation Agency or his or her  
3 designee; and 12 public members. Public members shall be  
4 appointed as follows:

5 (i) 2 members appointed by the President of the Senate  
6 and one member appointed by the Minority Leader of the  
7 Senate;

8 (ii) 2 members appointed by the Speaker of the House of  
9 Representatives and one member appointed by the Minority  
10 Leader of the House of Representatives; and

11 (iii) 6 members, no more than 4 of whom shall be of the  
12 same political party, appointed by the Governor.

13 The public members shall be residents of this State, chosen  
14 with due regard to broad geographic representation and ethnic  
15 diversity, who have served actively in organizations that  
16 educate the public on the history of the African slave trade,  
17 the contributions of African-Americans to our society, and  
18 civil rights issues.

19 Each public member of the Commission shall serve for a term  
20 of 3 years, except that of the initial members so appointed:  
21 one member appointed by the President of the Senate, one member  
22 appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and 2  
23 members appointed by the Governor shall serve for terms of one  
24 year; the member appointed by the Minority Leader of the  
25 Senate, one member appointed by the Speaker of the House of  
26 Representatives, and 2 members appointed by the Governor shall

1 serve for terms of 2 years; and one member appointed by the  
2 President of the Senate, the member appointed by the Minority  
3 Leader of the House of Representatives, and 2 members appointed  
4 by the Governor shall serve for terms of 3 years. Public  
5 members shall be eligible for reappointment. They shall serve  
6 until their successors are appointed and qualified, and the  
7 term of the successor of any incumbent shall be calculated from  
8 the expiration of the term of that incumbent. A vacancy  
9 occurring other than by expiration of term shall be filled in  
10 the same manner as the original appointment, but for the  
11 unexpired term only.

12 (d) Election of chairperson; meetings. At its first meeting  
13 and annually thereafter, the Commission shall elect from among  
14 its members a chairperson and other officers it considers  
15 necessary or appropriate. After its first meeting, the  
16 Commission shall meet at least quarterly, or more frequently at  
17 the call of the chairperson or if requested by 9 or more  
18 members.

19 (e) Quorum. A majority of the members of the Commission  
20 constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at a  
21 meeting of the Commission. A majority of the members present  
22 and serving is required for official action of the Commission.

23 (f) Public meeting. All business that the Commission is  
24 authorized to perform shall be conducted at a public meeting of  
25 the Commission, held in compliance with the Open Meetings Act.

26 (g) Freedom of Information. A writing prepared, owned,

1 used, in the possession of, or retained by the Commission in  
2 the performance of an official function is subject to the  
3 Freedom of Information Act.

4 (h) Compensation. The members of the Commission shall serve  
5 without compensation, but shall be entitled to reimbursement  
6 for all necessary expenses incurred in the performance of their  
7 official duties as members of the Commission from funds  
8 appropriated for that purpose. Reimbursement for travel,  
9 meals, and lodging shall be in accordance with the rules of the  
10 Governor's Travel Control Board.

11 (i) Duties. The Commission shall have the following  
12 responsibilities and duties:

13 (1) To provide, based upon the collective interest of  
14 the members and the knowledge and experience of the  
15 members, assistance and advice to schools within the State  
16 with respect to the implementation of education, awareness  
17 programs, textbooks, and educational materials concerned  
18 with the African slave trade, slavery in America, the  
19 vestiges of slavery in this country, and the contributions  
20 of African-Americans to our society.

21 (2) To survey and catalog the extent and breadth of  
22 education concerning the African slave trade, slavery in  
23 America, the vestiges of slavery in this country, and the  
24 contributions of African-Americans to our society  
25 presently being incorporated into the curricula and  
26 textbooks and taught in the school systems of the State; to

1 inventory those African slave trade, American slavery, or  
2 relevant African-American history memorials, exhibits, and  
3 resources that should be incorporated into courses of study  
4 at educational institutions, schools, and various other  
5 locations throughout the State; and to assist the State  
6 Board of Education and other State and educational agencies  
7 in the development and implementation of African slave  
8 trade, American slavery, and African-American history  
9 education programs.

10 (3) To act as a liaison with textbook publishers,  
11 schools, public, private, and nonprofit resource  
12 organizations, and members of the United States Senate and  
13 House of Representatives and the Illinois Senate and House  
14 of Representatives in order to facilitate the inclusion of  
15 the history of African slavery and of African-Americans in  
16 this country in the curricula of public and nonpublic  
17 schools.

18 (4) To compile a roster of individual volunteers who  
19 are willing to share their knowledge and experience in  
20 classrooms, seminars, and workshops with students and  
21 teachers on the subject of the African slave trade,  
22 American slavery, the impact of slavery on our society  
23 today, and the contributions of African-Americans to our  
24 country.

25 (5) To coordinate events memorializing the African  
26 slave trade, American slavery, and the history of

1 African-Americans in this country that reflect the  
2 contributions of African-Americans in overcoming the  
3 burdens of slavery and its vestiges, and to seek volunteers  
4 who are willing and able to participate in commemorative  
5 events that will enhance student awareness of the  
6 significance of the African slave trade, American slavery,  
7 its historical impact, and the struggle for freedom.

8 (6) To prepare reports for the Governor and the General  
9 Assembly regarding its findings and recommendations on  
10 facilitating the inclusion of the African slave trade,  
11 American slavery studies, African-American history, and  
12 special programs in the educational system of the State.

13 (7) To develop, in consultation with the State Board of  
14 Education, curriculum guidelines that will be made  
15 available to every school board for the teaching of  
16 information on the African slave trade, slavery in America,  
17 the vestiges of slavery in this country, and the  
18 contributions of African-Americans to our country.

19 (8) To solicit, receive, and accept appropriations,  
20 gifts, and donations for Commission operations and  
21 programs authorized under this Section.

22 (j) Commission requests for assistance. The Commission is  
23 authorized to call upon any department, office, division, or  
24 agency of the State, or of any county, municipality, or school  
25 district of the State, to supply such data, program reports,  
26 and other information, appropriate school personnel, and



1 assistance as it deems necessary to discharge its  
2 responsibilities under this Act. These departments, offices,  
3 divisions, and agencies shall, to the extent possible and not  
4 inconsistent with any other law of this State, cooperate with  
5 the Commission and shall furnish it with such information,  
6 appropriate school personnel, and assistance as may be  
7 necessary or helpful to accomplish the purposes of this Act.

8 (k) State Board of Education assistance. The State Board of  
9 Education shall:

10 (1) Assist the Amistad Commission in marketing and  
11 distributing to educators, administrators, and school  
12 districts in the State educational information and other  
13 materials on the African slave trade, slavery in America,  
14 the vestiges of slavery in this country, and the  
15 contributions of African-Americans to our society.

16 (2) Conduct at least one teacher workshop annually on  
17 the African slave trade, slavery in America, the vestiges  
18 of slavery in this country, and the contributions of  
19 African-Americans to our society.

20 (3) Assist the Amistad Commission in monitoring the  
21 inclusion of slavery materials and curricula in the State's  
22 educational system.

23 (4) Consult with the Amistad Commission to determine  
24 ways it may survey, catalog, and extend slave trade and  
25 American slavery education presently being taught in the  
26 State's educational system.

1           The State Board of Education may, subject to the  
2 availability of appropriations, hire additional staff and  
3 consultants to carry out the duties and responsibilities  
4 provided within this subsection (k).

5           (1) Report. The Commission shall report its activities and  
6 findings, as required under subsection (i), to the Governor and  
7 General Assembly on or before June 30, 2006, and biannually  
8 thereafter.

11           Sec. 34. Internal Auditor. There is created the Office of  
12 the Internal Auditor of the Historic Preservation Agency. The  
13 Internal Auditor shall be appointed by the Board, shall serve

15 The Internal Auditor shall audit and maintain the financial  
16 books, records, papers, and transactions of the ~~Lincoln~~

19 Auditor shall prepare an annual report for each fiscal year of

8 editions of newspapers of this State. Such editions shall be  
9 microphotographed. The negatives of such microphotographs  
10 shall be stored in a place provided by the Abraham Lincoln  
11 Presidential Library.

12 The State Historian shall determine on the basis of  
13 historical value the various newspaper edition files which  
14 shall be microphotographed and shall arrange a schedule for  
15 such microphotographing. The State Historian shall supervise  
16 the making of arrangements for acquiring access to past edition  
17 files with the editors or publishers of the various newspapers.

18 The method of microphotography to be employed in this  
19 program shall conform to the standards established pursuant to

21 Upon payment to the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library of  
22 the required fee, any person or organization shall be supplied  
23 with any prints requested to be made from the negatives of the  
24 microphotographs. The fee required shall be determined by the

1 State Historian and shall be equal in amount to the cost  
2 incurred by the Lincoln Presidential Library in supplying the  
3 requested prints.

5 Section 60. The Liquor Control Act of 1934 is amended by  
6 changing Section 6-15 as follows:

7 (235 ILCS 5/6-15) (from Ch. 43, par. 130)

8 Sec. 6-15. No alcoholic liquors shall be sold or delivered  
9 in any building belonging to or under the control of the State  
10 or any political subdivision thereof except as provided in this  
11 Act. The corporate authorities of any city, village,  
12 incorporated town, township, or county may provide by  
13 ordinance, however, that alcoholic liquor may be sold or  
14 delivered in any specifically designated building belonging to  
15 or under the control of the municipality, township, or county,  
16 or in any building located on land under the control of the  
17 municipality, township, or county; provided that such township  
18 or county complies with all applicable local ordinances in any  
19 incorporated area of the township or county. Alcoholic liquor  
20 may be delivered to and sold under the authority of a special  
21 use permit on any property owned by a conservation district  
22 organized under the Conservation District Act, provided that  
23 (i) the alcoholic liquor is sold only at an event authorized by  
24 the governing board of the conservation district, (ii) the

1 issuance of the special use permit is authorized by the local  
2 liquor control commissioner of the territory in which the  
3 property is located, and (iii) the special use permit  
4 authorizes the sale of alcoholic liquor for one day or less.  
5 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at any airport  
6 belonging to or under the control of a municipality of more  
7 than 25,000 inhabitants, or in any building or on any golf  
8 course owned by a park district organized under the Park  
9 District Code, subject to the approval of the governing board  
10 of the district, or in any building or on any golf course owned  
11 by a forest preserve district organized under the Downstate  
12 Forest Preserve District Act, subject to the approval of the  
13 governing board of the district, or on the grounds within 500  
14 feet of any building owned by a forest preserve district  
15 organized under the Downstate Forest Preserve District Act  
16 during times when food is dispensed for consumption within 500  
17 feet of the building from which the food is dispensed, subject

1 conference and convention type activities alcoholic liquors  
2 shall be limited to the use of the convention or conference  
3 participants or participants in cultural, political or  
4 educational activities held in such facilities, and provided  
5 further that the faculty or staff of the State university or a  
6 public community college district, or members of an  
7 organization of students, alumni, faculty or staff of the State  
8 university or a public community college district are active  
9 participants in the conference or convention, or in Memorial  
10 Stadium on the campus of the University of Illinois at  
11 Urbana-Champaign during games in which the Chicago Bears  
12 professional football team is playing in that stadium during  
13 the renovation of Soldier Field, not more than one and a half  
14 hours before the start of the game and not after the end of the  
15 third quarter of the game, or in the Pavilion Facility on the  
16 campus of the University of Illinois at Chicago during games in  
17 which the Chicago Storm professional soccer team is playing in  
18 that facility, not more than one and a half hours before the  
19 start of the game and not after the end of the third quarter of  
20 the game, or in the Pavilion Facility on the campus of the  
21 University of Illinois at Chicago during games in which the  
22 WNBA professional women's basketball team is playing in that  
23 facility, not more than one and a half hours before the start  
24 of the game and not after the 10-minute mark of the second half  
25 of the game, or by a catering establishment which has rented  
26 facilities from a board of trustees of a public community

1 college district, or in a restaurant that is operated by a  
2 commercial tenant in the North Campus Parking Deck building  
3 that (1) is located at 1201 West University Avenue, Urbana,  
4 Illinois and (2) is owned by the Board of Trustees of the  
5 University of Illinois, or, if approved by the District board,  
6 on land owned by the Metropolitan Sanitary District of Greater  
7 Chicago and leased to others for a term of at least 20 years.  
8 Nothing in this Section precludes the sale or delivery of  
9 alcoholic liquor in the form of original packaged goods in  
10 premises located at 500 S. Racine in Chicago belonging to the  
11 University of Illinois and used primarily as a grocery store by  
12 a commercial tenant during the term of a lease that predates  
13 the University's acquisition of the premises; but the  
14 University shall have no power or authority to renew, transfer,  
15 or extend the lease with terms allowing the sale of alcoholic  
16 liquor; and the sale of alcoholic liquor shall be subject to  
17 all local laws and regulations. After the acquisition by  
18 Winnebago County of the property located at 404 Elm Street in  
19 Rockford, a commercial tenant who sold alcoholic liquor at  
20 retail on a portion of the property under a valid license at  
21 the time of the acquisition may continue to do so for so long  
22 as the tenant and the County may agree under existing or future  
23 leases, subject to all local laws and regulations regarding the  
24 sale of alcoholic liquor. Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to  
25 and sold at Memorial Hall, located at 211 North Main Street,  
26 Rockford, under conditions approved by Winnebago County and



1 subject to all local laws and regulations regarding the sale of  
2 alcoholic liquor. Each facility shall provide dram shop  
3 liability in maximum insurance coverage limits so as to save  
4 harmless the State, municipality, State university, airport,  
5 golf course, faculty center, facility in which conference and  
6 convention type activities take place, park district, Forest  
7 Preserve District, public community college district,  
8 aquarium, museum, or sanitary district from all financial loss,  
9 damage or harm. Alcoholic liquors may be sold at retail in  
10 buildings of golf courses owned by municipalities or Illinois  
11 State University in connection with the operation of an  
12 established food serving facility during times when food is  
13 dispensed for consumption upon the premises. Alcoholic liquors  
14 may be delivered to and sold at retail in any building owned by  
15 a fire protection district organized under the Fire Protection  
16 District Act, provided that such delivery and sale is approved  
17 by the board of trustees of the district, and provided further  
18 that such delivery and sale is limited to fundraising events  
19 and to a maximum of 6 events per year. However, the limitation  
20 to fundraising events and to a maximum of 6 events per year  
21 does not apply to the delivery, sale, or manufacture of  
22 alcoholic liquors at the building located at 59 Main Street in  
23 Oswego, Illinois, owned by the Oswego Fire Protection District  
24 if the alcoholic liquor is sold or dispensed as approved by the  
25 Oswego Fire Protection District and the property is no longer  
26 being utilized for fire protection purposes.

1           Alcoholic liquors may be served or sold in buildings under  
2 the control of the Board of Trustees of the University of  
3 Illinois for events that the Board may determine are public  
4 events and not related student activities. The Board of  
5 Trustees shall issue a written policy within 6 months of the  
6 effective date of this amendatory Act of the 95th General  
7 Assembly concerning the types of events that would be eligible  
8 for an exemption. Thereafter, the Board of Trustees may issue  
9 revised, updated, new, or amended policies as it deems  
10 necessary and appropriate. In preparing its written policy, the  
11 Board of Trustees shall, among other factors it considers  
12 relevant and important, give consideration to the following:  
13 (i) whether the event is a student activity or student related  
14 activity; (ii) whether the physical setting of the event is  
15 conducive to control of liquor sales and distribution; (iii)  
16 the ability of the event operator to ensure that the sale or

3 that any event at which alcoholic liquors are served or sold in

5 require the prior written approval of the Office of the  
6 Chancellor for the University campus where the event is  
7 located. The Board of Trustees shall submit its policy, and any  
8 subsequently revised, updated, new, or amended policies, to the  
9 Illinois Liquor Control Commission, and any University event,  
10 or location for an event, exempted under such policies shall  
11 apply for a license under the applicable Sections of this Act.

12 Alcoholic liquors may be served or sold in buildings under  
13 the control of the Board of Trustees of Northern Illinois  
14 University for events that the Board may determine are public  
15 events and not student-related activities. The Board of  
16 Trustees shall issue a written policy within 6 months after  
17 June 28, 2011 (the effective date of Public Act 97-45)  
18 concerning the types of events that would be eligible for an  
19 exemption. Thereafter, the Board of Trustees may issue revised,  
20 updated, new, or amended policies as it deems necessary and  
21 appropriate. In preparing its written policy, the Board of  
22 Trustees shall, in addition to other factors it considers  
23 relevant and important, give consideration to the following:  
24 (i) whether the event is a student activity or student-related  
25 activity; (ii) whether the physical setting of the event is  
26 conducive to control of liquor sales and distribution; (iii)

1 the ability of the event operator to ensure that the sale or

19 ~~amendatory Act of the 98th General Assembly~~ concerning the  
20 types of events that would be eligible for an exemption.  
21 Thereafter, the Board of Trustees may issue revised, updated,  
22 new, or amended policies as it deems necessary and appropriate.  
23 In preparing its written policy, the Board of Trustees shall,  
24 in addition to other factors it considers relevant and  
25 important, give consideration to the following: (i) whether the  
26 event is a student activity or student-related activity; (ii)

19 effective date of this amendatory Act of the 97th General  
20 Assembly concerning the types of events that would be eligible  
21 for an exemption. Thereafter, the Board of Trustees may issue  
22 revised, updated, new, or amended policies as it deems  
23 necessary and appropriate. In preparing its written policy, the  
24 Board of Trustees shall, in addition to other factors it

19 attendance is 20 or more persons, and if the person or facility  
20 selling or dispensing the alcoholic liquor has provided dram  
21 shop liability insurance in maximum limits so as to hold  
22 harmless the Village of Dolton and the State from all financial  
23 loss, damage and harm.

24 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at retail in  
25 any building used as an Illinois State Armory provided:

26 (i) the Adjutant General's written consent to the

1 issuance of a license to sell alcoholic liquor in such  
2 building is filed with the Commission;

3 (ii) the alcoholic liquor is sold or dispensed only in  
4 connection with organized functions held on special  
5 occasions;

6 (iii) the organized function is one for which the  
7 planned attendance is 25 or more persons; and

8 (iv) the facility selling or dispensing the alcoholic  
9 liquors has provided dram shop liability insurance in  
10 maximum limits so as to save harmless the facility and the  
11 State from all financial loss, damage or harm.

12 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at retail in  
13 the Chicago Civic Center, provided that:

14 (i) the written consent of the Public Building  
15 Commission which administers the Chicago Civic Center is  
16 filed with the Commission;

17 (ii) the alcoholic liquor is sold or dispensed only in  
18 connection with organized functions held on special  
19 occasions;

20 (iii) the organized function is one for which the  
21 planned attendance is 25 or more persons;

22 (iv) the facility selling or dispensing the alcoholic  
23 liquors has provided dram shop liability insurance in  
24 maximum limits so as to hold harmless the Civic Center, the  
25 City of Chicago and the State from all financial loss,  
26 damage or harm; and

1 (v) all applicable local ordinances are complied with.

2 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered or sold in any building  
3 belonging to or under the control of any city, village or  
4 incorporated town where more than 75% of the physical  
5 properties of the building is used for commercial or  
6 recreational purposes, and the building is located upon a pier  
7 extending into or over the waters of a navigable lake or stream  
8 or on the shore of a navigable lake or stream. In accordance  
9 with a license issued under this Act, alcoholic liquor may be  
10 sold, served, or delivered in buildings and facilities under  
11 the control of the Department of Natural Resources during  
12 events or activities lasting no more than 7 continuous days  
13 upon the written approval of the Director of Natural Resources  
14 acting as the controlling government authority. The Director of  
15 Natural Resources may specify conditions on that approval,  
16 including but not limited to requirements for insurance and  
17 hours of operation. Notwithstanding any other provision of this  
18 Act, alcoholic liquor sold by a United States Army Corps of  
19 Engineers or Department of Natural Resources concessionaire  
20 who was operating on June 1, 1991 for on-premises consumption  
21 only is not subject to the provisions of Articles IV and IX.  
22 Beer and wine may be sold on the premises of the Joliet Park  
23 District Stadium owned by the Joliet Park District when written  
24 consent to the issuance of a license to sell beer and wine in  
25 such premises is filed with the local liquor commissioner by  
26 the Joliet Park District. Beer and wine may be sold in



1 buildings on the grounds of State veterans' homes when written  
2 consent to the issuance of a license to sell beer and wine in  
3 such buildings is filed with the Commission by the Department  
4 of Veterans' Affairs, and the facility shall provide dram shop  
5 liability in maximum insurance coverage limits so as to save  
6 the facility harmless from all financial loss, damage or harm.  
7 Such liquors may be delivered to and sold at any property owned  
8 or held under lease by a Metropolitan Pier and Exposition  
9 Authority or Metropolitan Exposition and Auditorium Authority.

10 Beer and wine may be sold and dispensed at professional  
11 sporting events and at professional concerts and other  
12 entertainment events conducted on premises owned by the Forest  
13 Preserve District of Kane County, subject to the control of the  
14 District Commissioners and applicable local law, provided that  
15 dram shop liability insurance is provided at maximum coverage  
16 limits so as to hold the District harmless from all financial  
17 loss, damage and harm.

18 Nothing in this Section shall preclude the sale or delivery  
19 of beer and wine at a State or county fair or the sale or  
20 delivery of beer or wine at a city fair in any otherwise lawful  
21 manner.

22 Alcoholic liquors may be sold at retail in buildings in  
23 State parks under the control of the Department of Natural  
24 Resources, provided:

- 25 a. the State park has overnight lodging facilities with  
26 some restaurant facilities or, not having overnight

1 lodging facilities, has restaurant facilities which serve  
2 complete luncheon and dinner or supper meals,

3 b. consent to the issuance of a license to sell  
4 alcoholic liquors in the buildings has been filed with the  
5 commission by the Department of Natural Resources, and

6 c. the alcoholic liquors are sold by the State park  
7 lodge or restaurant concessionaire only during the hours  
8 from 11 o'clock a.m. until 12 o'clock midnight.  
9 Notwithstanding any other provision of this Act, alcoholic  
10 liquor sold by the State park or restaurant concessionaire  
11 is not subject to the provisions of Articles IV and IX.

12 Alcoholic liquors may be sold at retail in buildings on  
13 properties under the control of the ~~Historic Sites and~~  
14 ~~Preservation Division of the~~ Historic Preservation Agency or  
15 the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum provided:

16 a. the property has overnight lodging facilities with  
17 some restaurant facilities or, not having overnight  
18 lodging facilities, has restaurant facilities which serve  
19 complete luncheon and dinner or supper meals,

20 b. consent to the issuance of a license to sell  
21 alcoholic liquors in the buildings has been filed with the  
22 commission by the ~~Historic Sites and Preservation Division~~  
23 ~~of the~~ Historic Preservation Agency or the Abraham Lincoln  
24 Presidential Library and Museum, and

25 c. the alcoholic liquors are sold by the lodge or  
26 restaurant concessionaire only during the hours from 11

1 o'clock a.m. until 12 o'clock midnight.

2 The sale of alcoholic liquors pursuant to this Section does  
3 not authorize the establishment and operation of facilities  
4 commonly called taverns, saloons, bars, cocktail lounges, and  
5 the like except as a part of lodge and restaurant facilities in  
6 State parks or golf courses owned by Forest Preserve Districts  
7 with a population of less than 3,000,000 or municipalities or  
8 park districts.

9 Alcoholic liquors may be sold at retail in the Springfield  
10 Administration Building of the Department of Transportation  
11 and the Illinois State Armory in Springfield; provided, that  
12 the controlling government authority may consent to such sales  
13 only if

- 14 a. the request is from a not-for-profit organization;  
15 b. such sales would not impede normal operations of the  
16 departments involved;  
17 c. the not-for-profit organization provides dram shop  
18 liability in maximum insurance coverage limits and agrees  
19 to defend, save harmless and indemnify the State of  
20 Illinois from all financial loss, damage or harm;  
21 d. no such sale shall be made during normal working  
22 hours of the State of Illinois; and  
23 e. the consent is in writing.

24 Alcoholic liquors may be sold at retail in buildings in  
25 recreational areas of river conservancy districts under the  
26 control of, or leased from, the river conservancy districts.

1 Such sales are subject to reasonable local regulations as  
2 provided in Article IV; however, no such regulations may  
3 prohibit or substantially impair the sale of alcoholic liquors  
4 on Sundays or Holidays.

5 Alcoholic liquors may be provided in long term care  
6 facilities owned or operated by a county under Division 5-21 or  
7 5-22 of the Counties Code, when approved by the facility  
8 operator and not in conflict with the regulations of the  
9 Illinois Department of Public Health, to residents of the  
10 facility who have had their consumption of the alcoholic  
11 liquors provided approved in writing by a physician licensed to  
12 practice medicine in all its branches.

13 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and dispensed in  
14 State housing assigned to employees of the Department of  
15 Corrections. No person shall furnish or allow to be furnished  
16 any alcoholic liquors to any prisoner confined in any jail,  
17 reformatory, prison or house of correction except upon a  
18 physician's prescription for medicinal purposes.

19 Alcoholic liquors may be sold at retail or dispensed at the  
20 Willard Ice Building in Springfield, at the State Library in  
21 Springfield, and at Illinois State Museum facilities by (1) an  
22 agency of the State, whether legislative, judicial or  
23 executive, provided that such agency first obtains written  
24 permission to sell or dispense alcoholic liquors from the  
25 controlling government authority, or by (2) a not-for-profit  
26 organization, provided that such organization:

23 State Library in Springfield shall be the Secretary of State.

24           Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at retail or  
25 dispensed at any facility, property or building under the  
26 jurisdiction of the ~~Historic Sites and Preservation Division of~~

1 ~~the~~ Historic Preservation Agency or the Abraham Lincoln  
2 Presidential Library and Museum where the delivery, sale or  
3 dispensing is by (1) an agency of the State, whether  
4 legislative, judicial or executive, provided that such agency  
5 first obtains written permission to sell or dispense alcoholic  
6 liquors from a controlling government authority, or by (2) an  
7 individual or organization provided that such individual or  
8 organization:

1 for the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum shall  
2 be the Executive Director of the Abraham Lincoln Presidential  
3 Library and Museum.

4 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at retail or  
5 dispensed for consumption at the Michael Bilandic Building at  
6 160 North LaSalle Street, Chicago IL 60601, after the normal  
7 business hours of any day care or child care facility located  
8 in the building, by (1) a commercial tenant or subtenant  
9 conducting business on the premises under a lease made pursuant  
10 to Section 405-315 of the Department of Central Management  
11 Services Law (20 ILCS 405/405-315), provided that such tenant  
12 or subtenant who accepts delivery of, sells, or dispenses  
13 alcoholic liquors shall procure and maintain dram shop  
14 liability insurance in maximum coverage limits and in which the  
15 carrier agrees to defend, indemnify, and save harmless the  
16 State of Illinois from all financial loss, damage, or harm  
17 arising out of the delivery, sale, or dispensing of alcoholic  
18 liquors, or by (2) an agency of the State, whether legislative,

19 indemnify the State of Illinois from all financial loss,  
20 damage or harm arising out of the selling or dispensing of  
21 alcoholic liquors.

22 Nothing in this Act shall prevent a not-for-profit  
23 organization or agency of the State from employing the services  
24 of a catering establishment for the selling or dispensing of  
25 alcoholic liquors at functions authorized by the Director of  
26 Central Management Services.

1           Alcoholic liquors may be sold or delivered at any facility  
2 owned by the Illinois Sports Facilities Authority provided that  
3 dram shop liability insurance has been made available in a  
4 form, with such coverage and in such amounts as the Authority  
5 reasonably determines is necessary.

6           Alcoholic liquors may be sold at retail or dispensed at the  
7 Rockford State Office Building by (1) an agency of the State,  
8 whether legislative, judicial or executive, provided that such  
9 agency first obtains written permission to sell or dispense  
10 alcoholic liquors from the Department of Central Management  
11 Services, or by (2) a not-for-profit organization, provided  
12 that such organization:

13           a. Obtains written consent from the Department of  
14 Central Management Services;

15           b. Sells or dispenses the alcoholic liquors in a manner  
16 that does not impair normal operations of State offices  
17 located in the building;

18           c. Sells or dispenses alcoholic liquors only in  
19 connection with an official activity in the building;

20           d. Provides, or its catering service provides, dram  
21 shop liability insurance in maximum coverage limits and in  
22 which the carrier agrees to defend, save harmless and  
23 indemnify the State of Illinois from all financial loss,  
24 damage or harm arising out of the selling or dispensing of  
25 alcoholic liquors.

26           Nothing in this Act shall prevent a not-for-profit

1 organization or agency of the State from employing the services  
2 of a catering establishment for the selling or dispensing of  
3 alcoholic liquors at functions authorized by the Department of  
4 Central Management Services.

5 Alcoholic liquors may be sold or delivered in a building  
6 that is owned by McLean County, situated on land owned by the  
7 county in the City of Bloomington, and used by the McLean  
8 County Historical Society if the sale or delivery is approved  
9 by an ordinance adopted by the county board, and the  
10 municipality in which the building is located may not prohibit  
11 that sale or delivery, notwithstanding any other provision of  
12 this Section. The regulation of the sale and delivery of  
13 alcoholic liquor in a building that is owned by McLean County,  
14 situated on land owned by the county, and used by the McLean  
15 County Historical Society as provided in this paragraph is an  
16 exclusive power and function of the State and is a denial and  
17 limitation under Article VII, Section 6, subsection (h) of the  
18 Illinois Constitution of the power of a home rule municipality  
19 to regulate that sale and delivery.

20 Alcoholic liquors may be sold or delivered in any building  
21 situated on land held in trust for any school district  
22 organized under Article 34 of the School Code, if the building  
23 is not used for school purposes and if the sale or delivery is  
24 approved by the board of education.

25 Alcoholic liquors may be sold or delivered in buildings  
26 owned by the Community Building Complex Committee of Boone

1 County, Illinois if the person or facility selling or  
2 dispensing the alcoholic liquor has provided dram shop  
3 liability insurance with coverage and in amounts that the  
4 Committee reasonably determines are necessary.

5 Alcoholic liquors may be sold or delivered in the building  
6 located at 1200 Centerville Avenue in Belleville, Illinois and  
7 occupied by either the Belleville Area Special Education  
8 District or the Belleville Area Special Services Cooperative.

9 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at the Louis  
10 Joliet Renaissance Center, City Center Campus, located at 214  
11 N. Ottawa Street, Joliet, and the Food Services/Culinary Arts  
12 Department facilities, Main Campus, located at 1215 Houbolt  
13 Road, Joliet, owned by or under the control of Joliet Junior  
14 College, Illinois Community College District No. 525.

15 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at Triton  
16 College, Illinois Community College District No. 504.

17 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at the  
18 College of DuPage, Illinois Community College District No. 502.

19 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at the  
20 building located at 446 East Hickory Avenue in Apple River,  
21 Illinois, owned by the Apple River Fire Protection District,  
22 and occupied by the Apple River Community Association if the  
23 alcoholic liquor is sold or dispensed only in connection with  
24 organized functions approved by the Apple River Community  
25 Association for which the planned attendance is 20 or more  
26 persons and if the person or facility selling or dispensing the

1 alcoholic liquor has provided dram shop liability insurance in  
2 maximum limits so as to hold harmless the Apple River Fire  
3 Protection District, the Village of Apple River, and the Apple  
4 River Community Association from all financial loss, damage,  
5 and harm.

6 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at the Sikia  
7 Restaurant, Kennedy King College Campus, located at 740 West  
8 63rd Street, Chicago, and at the Food Services in the Great  
9 Hall/Washburne Culinary Institute Department facility, Kennedy  
10 King College Campus, located at 740 West 63rd Street, Chicago,  
11 owned by or under the control of City Colleges of Chicago,  
12 Illinois Community College District No. 508.
