1995 VETO MESSAGES OF HOUSE BILLS

This legislation requires gasoline retailers to post a schedule of all applicable state and federal taxes and fees near their gasoline pumps. It is vetoed because it constitutes an unnecessary intrusion of state government into the private economy, involving enforcement efforts which would be better spent on more meaningful pursuits.

H 134 ADDITIONAL QUAY MAGISTRATE

HOUSE EXECUTIVE MESSAGE NO. 37

I have this day VETOED and am returning HOUSE BILL 134, as amended, enacted by the Forty-Second Legislature, State of New Mexico, First Session, 1995.

This legislation, which establishes a new magistrate judgeship in Quay County, is vetoed because the ongoing costs and additional personnel required do not appear to be justified at this time.

H 166 DEAF INTERPRETERS

HOUSE EXECUTIVE MESSAGE NO. 38

I have this day VETOED and am returning HOUSE BILL 166, enacted by the Forty-Second Legislature, State of New Mexico, First Session, 1995.

This legislation, which authorizes the Commission for Deaf and Hard of Hearing Persons to maintain a registry of deaf interpreters, is vetoed because the Commission is currently fulfilling that responsibility within its existing statutory authority. Moreover, the legislation establishes a statutory advisory commission. The need for, and authority of, advisory groups is best left to the discretion of agency management.
